ALLAN KING STUDENT LOAN FUND ESTABLISHED

The Allan King Student Loan Fund has been established to honor and remember Allan James King '36, and because of a long and enduring friendship. An endowment has been established with a gift of \$5,000 from George A. Allen '36 of Edina, Minnesota to provide for financially needy members of Delta Tau Delta to enable them to continue their college education at the University of North Dakota. Additional contributions have been received from Mrs. Clarice King and long-time friends of the Kings. George will be sending an invitation to Delts to participate in the memorial fund, and an investment to help needy students.



Allan was born on November 16, 1911 in Niagra, North Dakota to James and Flora King. Al's family included four sisters — Janet, Olive, Mary and Marjorie — and one brother, Floyd. Al graduated from the University of North Dakota in 1936 from the School of Commerce. While a member of Beta Chi and Delta Tau Delta, he served as Treasurer.

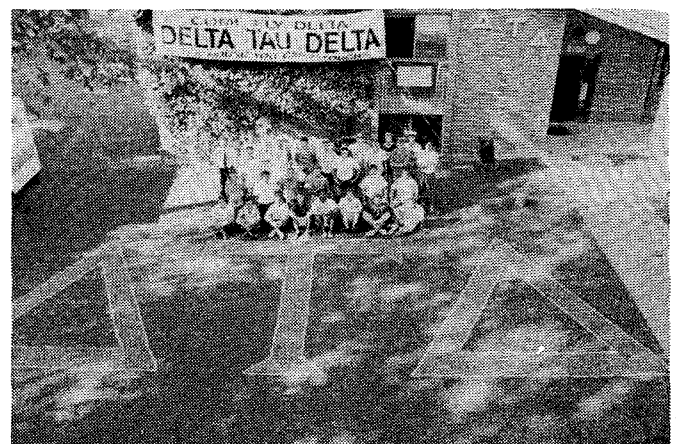
After graduation, he began his career in Duluth working for Burroughs as an accounting machine salesman. He later worked for National Cash Register Company in the same capacity, and worked with them until 1959. In November of 1959, he started his own company, Machine Records Company in San Mateo, California. Before moving to San Mateo, he worked in Minneapolis, Rochester and Des Moines. He retired as proprietor in 1981.

Allan was an active member of San Mateo Elks Lodge #1112 and enjoyed the fellowship of that organization. He was an avid reader, and watched the stock market carefully. Allan King passed away on April 18, 1990 at age 78. Clark Robinson '38 represented our Fraternity at the funeral service. Clark wrote "Brother Al was well liked by everyone who knew him. He was the most pleasant person to be with that I have ever known."

Allan King and Clarice Bernard of Duluth married

on April 26, 1943. They have four children: Michael of San Francisco, Allan B. of Salem, Oregon, Katherine Head of San Carlos, California, and Candace Young of Healdsburg, California. They have six grandchildren.

In a letter this summer, George Allen wrote, "I have never known a person who possessed as delightful a personality as Allan. He was an example for all, and touched each and everyone of us with his enthusiasm". In establishing the Allan King Student Loan Fund, George wishes to assist financially needy members of the Fraternity who are making good academic progress, but are having difficulty staying in school because of finances — a more common problem as tuition and other costs skyrocket. This fund is to help those who have exhausted other means of short-term loans including family, the University, personal assets, etc. This is a student loan fund of last resort to keep a student in college and in the Fraternity — rather than drop out. Applications will be made to the Educational Foundation and the Chapter Treasurer will be consulted to determine credit worthiness and history. Parents may be asked to co-sign the loan. Announcements will be made of the loans so that Allan J. King's name will be perpetuated.

LYLE LUND '49 RETIRES FROM MINNKOTA

Lyle Lund '49 retired as general manager of Minnkota Power Cooperative of Grand Forks after 41 years of service on July 1, 1990. Lund's employment started in June of 1949 as results engineer after receiving his electrical engineering degree from the University of North Dakota. He was promoted to business manager in 1953, to assist general manager in 1965, and general manager on January 1, 1983. He also served as general manager of The Square Butte Electric Cooperative, a massive electrical generating station at Center, North Dakota.



Lund says he is "grateful for the chance to help build a unique and effective electric power system. Minnkota has been fortunate to work with managers, directors, and cooperative staffs in harmonious and constructive efforts to improve the performance and reliability of the electric system. My life has been enriched by this association over the course of years."

He added "the owners of Minnkota can be justly proud. I am appreciative for the chance of knowing and working with truly talented and dedicated employees who knew their mission and were willing to expend the extra effort to accomplish something substantially better than the average performance."

Minnkota has been led by only two general managers in its history, Lyle Lund and Andy Freeman '32 (UND and Lambda Chi Alpha) who led the company from 1940 to 1982. Minnkota is recognized nationally as the lowest-cost provider of wholesale power in the nation, and as a technological leader with superior load-management, and innovative dual heat programs. Twelve Rural Electric Cooperatives and twelve municipal electric systems are members of the retail electric system in eastern North Dakota and northwestern Minnesota. Minnkota employs 380 people, with an operating budget in excess of \$110 million.

For many years, Lyle was a member of the board of directors of First Bank of Grand Forks. He lives at 2602 Cherry Street, Grand Forks, ND 58201, Phone 701-772-0177.

CHAPTER ETERNAL

Ted Kellogg '30

Theodore C. Kellogg '30 passed away on August 3, 1990 at Lake Havasu City, Arizona from heart difficulties. Ted was two weeks shy of his 86th birthday on August 19. Funeral services were held in Dickinson on August 10 at the First Congregational Church with long-time law partner, Ward Kirby, giving the eulogy. Ward mentioned that Ted never forgot his fraternity, was active with the chapter at UND, and the loyalty of the Fraternity was a gift Ted enjoyed his entire lifetime. Paul Robinson '32 and William Herauf '79,'83 represented our Fraternity.



Ted was born in Ohio in 1904 and raised at Schafer, North Dakota. He attended the University of North Dakota, taught school at Schafer to earn money for college, and graduated from the Law School in 1930. Ted was one of the most beloved members of the Fraternity since his college days. Lyle Fering '36 wrote "In my association with Ted, and thinking of him in later years, have felt that he was one of the best. He has such a great consideration in every way for others, had such dignity, and was so intelligent". He is credited with our affiliation with Delta Tau Delta since he delivered an eloquent speech before the Karnea of 1935, convincing them to add a chapter during the depression when the official fraternity policy was just to maintain existing chapters. Ted was a major contributor to the Fraternity, and a Kellogg Endowment for Campus Achievement has been established within our Educational Foundation. Several memorials have been received for that endowment.

In 1932, Ted set up a law practice in Dickinson in partnership with Mackoff. Both were leaders in obtaining rural electric service for southwestern North Dakota, as well as formation of several grazing associations. He was a fellow of the College of Trial Lawyers and International Trial Lawyers. He served as President of the North Dakota Bar Association from 1967-68. He was co-founder of the Jackrabbit Bar Association for the states of North and South Dakota, Montana, Wyoming, Utah, Idaho and New Mexico. He retired from practice in 1975. He was offered the Republican nomination for Governor, but declined. He was twice offered the UND Sioux Award, but did not wish the publicity.

Ted married Kathleen MacDonald '30 of Langdon on August 17, 1935 (president of Pi Beta Phi at UND), who passed away in July of 1983. They spent their summers at Silver Gate, Montana and winters at Lantana, Florida. He has been living in nursing homes since 1985 with infirmities. Surviving are two sons, both pharmacists, Robert and Meredel Kellogg of 737 Baker Avenue, Mankato, MN 56001 (Phone 507-387-5862) and Joseph and Donna Kellogg of Lake Havasu City, Arizona 86403 (Phone 602-453-1422).

John Carl Lokken '24 passed away at age 89 on August 16, 1990 at his home in Rossmoor, CA. John is survived by his son John Lokken Jr. of Novato, CA, grandson Corby Lokken of Rohnert Park, CA and brothers, Wendell Lokken '32 of Bowman, ND, Brown Lokken '31 of Spokane, WA. John worked for Dow Chemical.

Floyd Sax '34 of Sidney, Montana on July 2, 1990.

Steven Watkins Eiman '79 passed away from AIDS at age 34 on May 4, 1990 at his parent's home at Pocono Lake, Pennsylvania. "Rock" was a favorite at the chapter, and served as the cook his Freshman year and as Treasurer. Along with a great sense of humor, he was an accomplished piano player and vocalist. Steve was a flight instructor, a weather modification pilot, charter pilot, and flew with Pocono Airways, Ransome Airlines, Republic, and DC9s for Northwest Airlines. While at Sidney, Montana he built a two-seat Pitts biplane and was proficient in aerobatics. His memorial tablet will be inscribed "FLY ON ETERNAL WINGS, RGR GDA". The salutation on "Roger Good Day" is given to a control tower upon departure from the airport.



Steve is survived by his parents, Dr. John and Daisy Eiman at North Shore, Pocono Lake Preserve, PA 18348 (Phone 717-646-3309). Bill Herauf '79 and John Dynes '80 are planning to establish a Steve Eiman Endowment for a Scholarship in Music within the Educational Foundation, and Rock's friends are encouraged to participate. A Wake and Eulogies are

planned for Rock at Homecoming '90 on October 20. His parents will be in attendance as they would like to meet Steve's college friends.

Mrs. George (Glenna "Pat" Hagness) Allen . . '34 of Edina, Minnesota on July 19, 1990 from a long illness. Funeral services were held in Edina and at Hillsboro, Illinois where she is interred. Pat graduated valedictorian of her Central High School class in Grand Forks. She attended UND and affiliated with Gamma Phi Beta Sorority. She married George Allen '36 on May 21, 1937, and they lived in Chicago, Lansing, MI, St. Louis and since 1966 in Minneapolis. Their summer home in the Black Hills of South Dakota was Pat's special get-away. Survivors are George and their son Bob of Oak Park, Illinois and daughter Judith Smedley of Bakersfield, CA. Pat and George Allen were instrumental in the establishment of the Gamma Phi Beta Educational Foundation at UND, their only chapter in the nation to have such. Memorials were given to GPB Educational Foundation as the chapter celebrates their 70th year on campus.

Richard F. Allen . . '58 of Madison, Georgia from cancer on July 29, 1990. Dick was an electrician. Survivors include his wife, Jacqueline Kinzer Allen, sons Michael, Curtis and Jeffrey of Madison, and his mother Ruth Allen of Grand Forks.

CHAPTER RESPONSIBILITIES OF DELTA TAU DELTA

(FIFTH DRAFT)

ALCOHOL AND DRUGS

1. The possession, use and/or consumption of any alcoholic beverages by any fraternity member or guest, while on chapter premises, during chapter activities, or in any situation sponsored or endorsed by the chapter, must be in compliance with any and all laws and ordinances of the state, province, city, county, and university/college.
2. No chapter of Delta Tau Delta may purchase alcoholic beverages with fraternity funds, nor may any member in the name of or on behalf of the chapter coordinate the collections of any funds for such a purchase. This includes the purchase of kegs, party balls and other bulk quantities of alcoholic beverages. In addition no alcohol may be served from common source containers (kegs, party balls or other bulk containers) on chapter property or at chapter events.
3. The sale of alcoholic beverages by any chapter of Delta Tau Delta is strictly forbidden. No chapter of Delta Tau Delta shall participate in any activity or action which creates the impression that the chapter is selling alcohol. Examples include, but are not limited to: charging admission to parties, passing the hat, selling empty cups, selling drink tickets, or having vending machines which dispense alcoholic beverages.
4. The use or possession of any unlawful drug in any form is not permitted at any Delta Tau Delta function or in any Delta Tau Delta shelter.
5. Parties and social activities should be open to members and invited guests only. Open parties, meaning those with unrestricted access by nonmembers of the Fraternity, without specific written invitation, are prohibited.
6. All rush functions associated with any undergraduate chapter or alumni association or alumni chapter of Delta Tau Delta will be dry, that is without the presence of alcoholic beverages.
7. No alcohol should be present at any pledge program or initiation activity of the chapter.
8. No chapter may co-sponsor an event with an alcohol distributor, charitable organization or tavern (tavern defined as an establishment generating more than half of annual gross sales from alcohol) where alcohol is given away, sold or otherwise provided to those present. Chapters also may not co-sponsor functions where alcohol

is purchased by other fraternity chapters, groups or organizations.

9. Chapters are required to provide the Fraternity's alcohol and drug program (Delt Talking About Alcohol and Drugs) and its follow-up segments on progression of drinking choices and intervention. In addition to this program, designed to reduce risks for all health and impairment problems, chapters are also encouraged to use local resources to help them reduce risks of legal problems through programs on liability such as laws pertaining to the consumption of alcohol in the chapter's jurisdiction; dramshop liability; host liquor liability; responsibility toward the welfare of those who consume alcohol; intervention to prevent any person from drinking to excess; and the necessity to avoid any potentially dangerous activity, including driving a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol.
10. Compliance with items 1 through 9 is encouraged for immediate implementation by undergraduate chapters but will be mandated by July 1, 1991. In addition, prior to the July 1, 1991, deadline all chapters are required to comply with any and all laws regarding the consumption, purchase or treatment of alcohol.

HAZING

No chapter of Delta Tau Delta shall indulge in any physical abuse or undignified treatment (hazing) of its pledges or members. Hazing is defined as: any action taken or situation created intentionally, whether on or off fraternity premises, to produce mental or physical discomfort, embarrassment, harassment, or ridicule. Such activities and situations include paddling in any form; creation of excessive fatigue; physical and psychological shocks, treasure hunts, scavenger hunts, road trips or any other such activities; kidnapping of actives by pledges or pledges by actives as well as the forced consumption of alcohol; wearing publicly apparel which is conspicuous and not normally in good taste; engaging in any public stunts and buffoonery; morally degrading or humiliating games and activities; late work sessions which interfere with academic activity; and any other activities which are not consistent with fraternal law, Ritual or policy with the regulations and policies of the educational institution. Furthermore, chapters are to follow Delta Tau Delta's Delt Development Program.

ABUSIVE BEHAVIOR

The Fraternity will not tolerate or condone any form of abusive behavior on the part of its members,

whether physical, mental or emotional. This is to include any actions directed toward members or nonmembers.

PROPERTY MANAGEMENT

The shelter, along with its furnishings and landscape, should provide for each member an environment for study, clean and safe living conditions, and recreational facilities. A sound program focused on proper maintenance of the property, along with due regard for university/college, health, or fire department regulations, must be followed in each chapter.

ACADEMIC CORNER

Academics is at the core of the college experience. Although academics alone do not make for a complete college experience, it demands consistent effort to achieve academic success. The Academic Affairs Committee is concerned with excellence on an individual and chapter level. The committee realizes the need for improvement and has set goals to aspire to. Delta XI Chapter has gone through many improvements in the past two semesters—all of which were completed through alumni support.

In the fall of 1989, \$14,000 was invested into the renovation of the dining room. A complete new lighting system was installed to instill a study environment. The outcome was very successful and the dining area is much more comfortable to study in.

In the spring of 1990, funds were made available to tear down the old wallpaper in the upstairs/downstairs halls. The walls were then repainted and patched. Again the outcome of the improvements made Delta XI become a much more comfortable place to live in.

This last summer \$5,000 was made available through House Corporation for needed improvements. The money was spent replacing the carpet in the halls, stairways and living room. The projects will be completed by Homecoming time.
